The RNIB Accord USB player

Talking Books have come a long way since those first boxes of shellac records shipped out in 1935. The new RNIB Accord USB player takes that evolution a step further.

This combination USB player and Bluetooth speaker is specifically designed for blind and partially sighted users, with easy-to-use tactile controls, wireless charging, easy-to-locate ports, bookmarking features and chapter skipping function.

Small (just a little larger than a standard coffee mug) and highly portable, you can listen to Talking Books on USB and any other audio via Bluetooth – podcasts, BBC Sounds, Audible audiobooks, your 'dance like nobody's watching' playlist. If your smartphone or tablet can play it, you can listen to it on the RNIB Accord.

The rechargeable battery provides five to six hours listening on a full charge. Simply place the RNIB Accord on to the Qi wireless charger provided and hear the player announce when it is correctly positioned for charging. Your RNIB Accord is supplied with one Qi wireless charger and a USB-C cable, but not a USB charger plug – these can be purchased separately using product code HT376.

With its high quality speaker, the RNIB Accord is the perfect way to listen to your favourite things in the living room, kitchen, garden or shed.

Weighing only 384g (less than a tin of tomato soup!), you can easily move it with you as you go about your day. It is supplied with a lanyard attached for extra security.

Stylish and modern-looking, it has a black case with contrasting white buttons. The volume control buttons are a large, tactile plus and minus sign on one side of the device, designed to be easily located by touch. They also function as chapter skip forward/backward buttons.



The RNIB Accord's two other control buttons and all ports are on top of the device for ease of use. The round, white power button is engraved with a power symbol, and the white book/folder skip button is distinctly smaller and smooth. The power button also functions as the play/pause button.

The RNIB Accord gives voice prompts in a clear, natural, English male voice to indicate battery, Bluetooth, charging and software update status. It will also speak when headphones, a USB stick, or an SD card are connected/disconnected and when a control button is pressed, (for example, "Volume up", "Play", "Power on").



Bookmarking of your last position is automatic when the player is paused or stopped. When the USB stick is removed and reinserted the player will automatically start playing at the point you left off. The player can bookmark hundreds of individual USB sticks. You cannot add multiple bookmarks to a USB stick.

Tell your aspirin from your zopiclone

Braille on medication boxes is great – if you read braille. And sometimes the pharmacy puts your tablets into a generic white box with only the prescription label to identify the contents. If either of these problems cause you anxiety when you take regular medication, a talking label may be the solution.

The talking label audio labeller can be easily clipped on to the medicine box and a short message recorded, for example: "Warfarin, 5mg. Take one, once a day with food." You can play back the message at any time with the push of a button.

The device has a low profile, ergonomic design with one large, tactile 'play' button. Messages can be rerecorded if someone misspeaks, or the prescription information changes (for example, a lower or higher dose is required).

The talking label audio labeller fits all standard pill box packaging, and its metal clip will grip the packaging securely.

To record a message, a pen must be pushed through a small hole on the back of the gadget, near the microphone. This prevents the message being accidentally erased. A small red light indicates when the device is recording. Sighted assistance is required to record a message. You may want to ask your pharmacist to record the information needed.

The talking label audio labeller can also be used to identify other household items, such as washing powder, dishwasher tablets, cereal, tea bags, pasta, pet food pouches and other products that are stored in a box.

Stay on time with our new digital watch

Time waits for no man, woman or enby... Whether you need to be on time for the school pick-up, for the dentist to remind you to floss more, or for date night with your significant other, this easy-to-use, radio-controlled talking digital watch can help spare your blushes.



It announces the time in a clear, male, British voice at the press of a button. And at the press of another button, it reads out the day and date.

This sleek, modern looking watch is also easy to set up – once out of shipping mode it will automatically detect the time and date; and adjust itself in spring and autumn for British Summer Time.

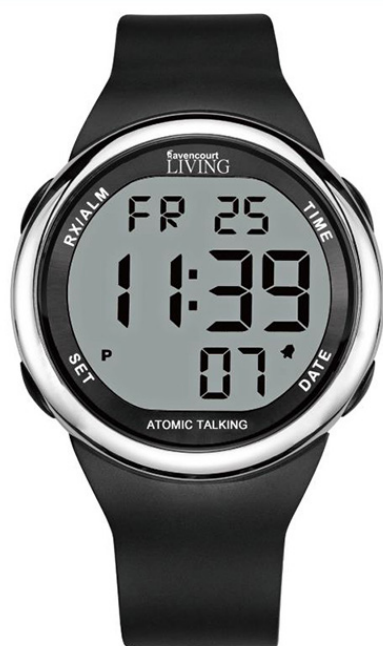
It has a large, clear digital face and loud, voice which announces the time in 12-hour format (for example, 11.34pm) when the 2 o'clock button is pressed.

Pressing the 4 o'clock button will speak the date (for example, Friday, 6th of May, Year 2022).

In addition to the optional daily alarm, there is an optional hourly announcement feature. When turned on, the watch announces the hour between 6am and 9pm.

Digits on the 40mm face are 10mm high (please note, the screen is not back lit). The black plastic case is complemented by a matching black plastic strap with metal buckle. This watch fits wrists 15.5cm to 23cm and is radio controlled in the UK, Germany, Japan, US (except Hawaii and Alaska). In other countries, time and date can be set manually.

The future is now!

Step into the future with this minimalist disc-shaped talking clock that can record and playback up to 10 daily reminders.

This small black clock has a large white button on top, which speaks the time in a clear English voice when pressed once (and the date if pressed again). Controls for set-up, alarms, volume, voice selection (male/female) and recording reminders are on the base of the clock.

There is also a small digital clock in the base to assist with alarm setting, although the clock has full voice support for set-up and alarm instruction.



To record a reminder, simply press and hold the Record button until it beeps, speak into the microphone (on the base of the clock) and release the button when you have finished recording. The clock will play the recording back to you. If you wish to re-record, press and hold the Record button again. Once you have confirmed your recording you can toggle between voice and beep to add it to an alarm.

This clock also features four-level volume control, a nine-minute snooze function and the compact design sits flat and secure, so it cannot easily be knocked over.

Because it is radio-controlled, which means it receives a signal from a radio transmitter, the time and date will set and regularly update automatically, including when the clocks change.

You can set your clock to receive either the UK, Germany, US or Japan time signals which means it will automatically update when you visit these countries. If you are outside these countries, you are also able to set up the time and date feature manually.

Hear the time with just a touch

RNIB's high-quality talking watches are back – with improved touch-sensitive glass to make telling the time even easier.



They still tell the time at the touch of a button, but you can now tap the glass twice or touch the glass for half a second to hear the time announced in a natural female voice (ideal if you have one hand busy with a cane or dog lead).

The watches still have a Swiss movement for excellent time-keeping, synchronised voice and hands, adjustable volume and no recessed buttons.

Easy-to-use, the hands on these watches automatically synchronise to the internal time set, so there is no need to manually set the hands or to rely on someone else to help you. A spoken menu guides you if you need to set the time or date, and if you want to set an alarm. You can also snooze the alarm with the press of a button.

The paperless braille slate

Take short braille notes or write yourself a reminder with this paperless, erasable 80-cell braille slate.

The Versa slate works like a regular slate and produces signage-quality braille. The stylus raises plastic dots which can be quickly erased when you're ready to write a new note or reminder.

It has four rows of 20 cells and a magnetic stylus which attaches directly to one side of the slate for easy storage.

Use the stylus to raise the plastic braille cells and flip the slate over to read the braille. You can use your finger to erase any typos and the slate's two sets of four buttons to erase large sections of braille (when you press the top and bottom button together, it erases the braille in that section of the slate – a five-cell wide section over all four rows).

The Versa Slate is a useful teaching tool for braille as the dots are easier to press than a typical stylus and paper. It's also handy for experienced brailleists who want to take down a phone number, make a note or write a reminder.

When bigger is better

Get more from your magnifier with the explorē 12, a large, portable magnifier with HD cameras for both near and distance viewing.



This 12-inch magnifier has two 21MP HD cameras and comes with a writing stand and carry-case. Its large, easy-to-find tactile buttons control magnification up to 30× and change the contrast / colour settings. The explorē 12 turns on instantly, either using the on/off button or by opening the built-in reading stand.

You can customise the start screen with your preferred colour setting and magnification level, and also on-screen guide lines and blinds if desired. A permanent on-screen icon allows you to switch easily between the reading camera and the distance camera. Use the camera button on the top edge of the explorē 12 to freeze an image and the touchscreen to magnify and move around the image. These zoom and pan tools allow you to read without moving your documents.

When used with its foldable stand, the explorē 12 rises above the table, giving you plenty of writing room. Connect the magnifier to a larger monitor or TV screen using the supplied HDMI cable to increase the size of the magnified image.

On a full charge, the explorē 12 has approximately 3.5 hours battery life. It recharges in approximately four hours using the USB-C cable provided. The magnifier can be used while it is re-charging. Each time the magnifier is turned on, a percentage battery level indicator is briefly displayed on the screen.

In the pink: Help for photo-phobia

Rose-tinted glasses are usually considered a bad thing, but these pink eyeshields are good news if you have extreme light sensitivity (photo-phobia).

The FL-41 filter lenses in these acunis eyeshields were developed for use by people with photo-phobia, such as those suffering from migraine or severe traumatic brain injury.

A study conducted in Birmingham in the 1990s showed that wearing FL-41 filter lenses resulted in a significant reduction in the frequency and severity of migraine attacks.

Wearing eyeshields with these FL-41 filters can also lead to significant improvements in the frequency and the strength of eyelid closure in cases of blepharospasm (eyelid spasm) caused by light sensitivity.

How do these filters work? The retinal ganglion cells which are the main conductors of the eye's (non-image forming) light regulation to the brain are also responsible for photophobia, which is often associated with migraine, among other things. Their sensitivity maximum is at approximately 484nm.

The pink-coloured FL-41 lenses have been specially developed for use in cases of hypersensitivity to light stimuli and specifically reduce the transmission of the blue-green wavelength range (480nm to 520nm) – the range to which migraine patients also react particularly sensitively, or which is perceived as particularly unpleasant in migraine-related photophobia.

Concentrating the filtering effect on this restricted wavelength range prevents the eyes adapting to ambient light conditions. This means that when the glasses are taken off, particularly indoors, the eyes are considerably less dazzled than would be the case with normal sunglasses which dim the entire visible spectrum evenly.

These eyeshields are available with a metal frame (small or large), pantoscopic (tilted) plastic frame, square plastic frame, as clip-ons, or as fitovers (small or large); and in a choice of tint: 25%, 50%, or 75%.

The 25% tint blocks approximately 25% of transmitted light and 30% of blue light; the 50% tint blocks approximately 50% of both; and the 75% tint blocks approximately 75% of transmitted light and 80% of blue light.

All the eyeshields in this range can be used for driving (daytime only – do not use for night driving), and offer protection against UVA and UVB radiation. Supplied with a case.

All frames are 14cm wide (5.51 inches), except the fitover frames which are 14.5cm (5.71 inches). Fitover frames are designed to be worn over your own prescription frame. These special anti-glare frames have an extra deep rim at the top and wide temples with side windows.
